From Your Pastor

The following passage of scripture came up in some of my devotional reading this past week. I normally would read this passage in the New Revised Standard Version or perhaps the Common English Bible, but in this particular devotion book, the passage was from THE MESSAGE version of the Bible. Reading it in a different translation made it seem fresh and new to me. And so I have been using it as my focus point this week:

"So here's what I want you to do, God helping you: Take your everyday, ordinary life — your sleeping, eating, going-to-work, and walking-around life — and place it before God as an offering. Embracing what God does for you is the best thing you can do for him. Don't become so well-adjusted to your culture that you fit into it without even thinking. Instead, fix your attention on God. You'll be changed from the inside out." (Romans 12:1-2, THE MESSAGE)

As I write this, the portion of this scripture that is really speaking to me today is, "Embracing what God does for you is the best thing you can do for him." To me, this means for one thing that I should live a life of gratefulness; that I should find something for which to be grateful all throughout my day.

Try this exercise. Stop what you are doing right now and find one thing that you are grateful for at this moment. It might be as simple as, "I am grateful that I am breathing," or "I am grateful for the birds singing out my window." Or perhaps, "I am grateful for this quiet moment in which I can focus on you, God."

Those are just three things that I am grateful for in this moment of my day as I write this. When I awoke this morning, I was grateful for a warm bed and the sun shine. Then I was grateful for the coffee brewing and my breakfast. I then thought about my family with gratefulness, and you, my church family, too. Throughout my day, I am going to continue the practice of gratefulness.

How about you? What will you give thanks for today?

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Spotlight on Genevieve Heath

Genevieve was born in 1920 in Brawley, Calif., near the Mexican border. She attended high school in Phoenix, Ariz., and lived in San Francisco during World War II. Following the death of her husband of 52 years, Ray F. Heath, she left California and moved to Concordia to be nearer her daughter Faith Nyswonger, a retired teacher, and Faith's husband Steve, a longtime judge in Garden City, both of whom live locally. Genevieve considers Concordia to be a "great blessing," meeting so many new and wonderful friends.

Genevieve has two other children, Jim, a retired teacher living in the Portland, Ore. area, and her youngest son R. Michael Owens, a certified rascal and retired Philadelphia lawyer who is familiar to many in North Central Kansas from his newspaper columns which appear each Sunday in the *Salina Journal*. She is also blessed with nine grandchildren and 15 great-grandchildren. No. 1 on Genevieve's pecking order is her beloved dog Duke, a Boston Terrier who sleeps away most of each day on Genevieve's lap.

Genevieve recently said, "God has directed my life in so many ways." One example came in 1950. With only a high school diploma, she was hired to teach all grades in a one-room schoolhouse in Las Plumas, Calif., a remote village literally built into the side of a steep mountain.



Part of the reason for her hiring was that she had two school-aged children, which pushed the tiny school over the minimum enrollment needed to remain open. At the age of 29, while teaching fulltime, Genevieve became a college freshman, attending summer school and taking night classes. It took 10 years to complete her degree, graduating from California State University, Chico. Beyond graduation, she continued to amass enough college credits to earn a post-graduate degree.

To get to that one-room schoolhouse in Las Plumas, you drove up a dangerous, curvy one-lane, dirt road hovering over a steep canyon hundreds of feet deep — without guardrails. After parking, you took an open-air tram to the bottom of the canyon and crossed over the mighty Feather River via a narrow, rickety wooden suspension bridge as long as a football field. No more than a few feet wide, the bridge swayed in the middle, a mere 20 ft. above the powerful river. You then walked across Western Pacific railroad tracks and climbed up stairs to a second open-air tram which took you up to Las Plumas on the other side of the canyon. One benefit of her teaching position was a house in the village. The nearest town was 20 miles away — you drove that far just to buy groceries and attend church. She met her husband Ray at the First United Methodist Church.

Las Plumas no longer exists – it's buried under water, beneath the massive lake created by Oroville Dam. With a height of 770 ft. it's one of the tallest dams in the world, taller even than Hoover Dam. Thus, was Feather River tamed, 20 mi. downstream. Two years ago, Oroville Dam made national headlines when 200,000 residents of Central California were evacuated due to fears that the dam might collapse. The dam has since been repaired.

After two years of teaching at Las Plumas, Genevieve and her family moved to Oroville, and she was hired to teach 1st and 2nd grades in nearby Richvale, Calif., where she taught until her retirement in 1977 at the age of 57. Richvale is a community of 200 residents, almost all of whom are direct descendants of Swedish immigrants. The town is famous for its rice production, including Lundberg Family Farms, a worldwide leader in organic rice products. The current President and CEO of Lundberg Family Farms was a student of Genevieve's in 1st Grade.

Nicknamed "Bengie" at an early age by her sister, Genevieve will celebrate her 99th birthday in October. She reads on average two or three books every week, and has for years completed the daily crossword, Word Jumble and Cryptoquip in the *Salina Journal*, virtually every morning. Her son Michael reports that he recently saw her play and win a video game on her computer while simultaneously carrying on a telephone conversation with a grandson. Her family calls her the Iron Lady. Perhaps a better description would be a Timex watch—Genevieve just "keeps on ticking." Don't get in Bengie's way – she might run you over!
