Pastor Peddling's:

I remember the first time I visited with folks who came for a commodity distribution. It was in the pre-Covid days, and people were lined up outdoors around the front of the building where the commodities were distributed.

I'd been helping getting commodities set up on tables inside the former car dealership showroom, so toward the end of setting up, I didn't have anything to do, so I went out to where folks were lining up. I took an old journalist's notebook I still had and a couple pens outside with me, and I started asking people how I could pray for them.

It's remarkable when you ask people how you can pray for them. What's remarkable about it is that some of them will pray for urgent personal matters – such as a major, life-saving ministry they have scheduled – but more often than not, people ask for prayers for others – loved ones, family members and friends who are struggling with everything from health to finances to grief. In the process of listening to the prayer requests, you get to hear some fantastic stories about people's lives.

When you ask people how you can pray for them, something about the relationship changes. Maybe it's because someone would take the time to go out and do something they'd never been asked before and the question sends a very important message about how they not only matter to you, but they matter to God. In those moments of conversation, maybe God connects you with people who haven't had the same privileges or people who have learned the importance of a grateful smile in spite of hardship. Maybe simply asking the question – "how may I pray for you" – sends a distinct message that the Christ in me wants to connect with the Christ in them to become the Christ among us.

I can't really say.

I still remember the first time I asked someone "how may I pray for you" because I was in Haiti, so I asked the question in a version of Creole and French, by asking people "mwen ka priya pou ou?" which is "how may I pray for you" in Creole.

I went to Haiti for my seminary immersion. The trip was a joint effort between Saint Paul School of Theology and the University of Missouri-Kansas City school of medicine. As seminary students, we helped by taking blood pressures, and checking people's weight and fevers before they went in to see the medical students and doctors.

Prior to the first clinic, we were told to only do the weights, pressures, and temperatures; nothing else, and if Haitian patients wanted someone to pray with them, they'd be sent out to see us after seeing the doctors. Out of around 200 people that day, we only prayed with three of them after they'd seen the doctors. That practice only lasted for that day until the other seminary students and I decided to heck with that instruction; we're serving the people and prayer is a service to these folks as we take their vitals.

So, from that day on, we prayed with the Haitian patients before they saw the medical students and doctors, and the medical students and doctors were shocked by how much calmer their patients were from that day forward.

That's because prayer changes things, as one of my first prayer group leaders once emphatically emphasized to me.

As my prayer life has developed through the years from once a day for maybe 15 minutes to now four times a day, each time for a minimum of 30 minutes and early for about two hours, my life has changed. God has made it possible for me to see things more clearly, love more dearly, pray more readily and I cherish the stories that come forth when prayer is at the center of life.

As Advent begins and we approach a new year, I would invite you to pray more and see where God takes you when you do because I believe there's a good chance God will introduce you to things about yourself and the world we share that you never even considered, and what God introduces to you will bring you some of the greatest experiences of your life. I know that's been the case for me.

The Church is behind \$29,000.00 in our giving. Please consider an end of the year donation to help eliminate this deficit.







Trustee Updates:

In the Spring of 2021, the church was hit by a hail storm. It took until the fall of 2022 to reach a settlement with the insurance company, and now the repairs have been finished. Over the past year, we have replaced the roof on the church including the flat roof on the front porch, and replaced the guttering. Inside, water damage was repaired and the surfaces repainted in areas that included, the chapel walls and ceiling, the ceiling in the entry, the walls and ceilings in three of the restrooms, the walls and ceilings in the Fellowship Hall, and in the Sanctuary, the cove, ceiling in the stairway to the balcony, and the upper portions of the walls on the East, West, and South sides. The sound absorption panels on the walls of the Fellowship Hall were all removed and cleaned of their water stains. The ceiling tiles on the main floor were also all replaced.

In addition to the repairs funded by the insurance claim, the following other projects were completed. Replaced some rotten facia and wrapping the facia behind the guttering with aluminum. The lights in the Fellowship Hall were rewired to remove the fluorescent ballast and install new LED lights in the fixtures. This should reduce the operational cost of the lights and limit the need to replace bulbs in the future. The roller shades on the Fellowship Hall windows were cleaned and repaired. Also in the Fellowship Hall, glass was replaced in one broken window and in the two entry lights. The exterior of the brick tower below the steeple was waterproofed to help prevent future water damage in the chapel.

In the Spring of 2022 one of the two boilers that heat the building quit working. The heat exchanger in it started leaking. The parts were ordered and every two weeks last winter we were calling the distributer in an effort to get the parts. The parts came in this fall and the boiler is now operational. This gives us the back up that was designed into the system, and the capacity to handle the occasional extreme lows. This repair was covered under the original warranty.
