Pastor Pedalings,

Throughout my years serving the church, I've read the Book of Discipline a few times, and there have been times I suggested it as reading material at night, so it can help people get to sleep.

The Book of Discipline has an interesting history. Until around 1930, the BoD was more like a guidebook that Methodists were to use, not in a legalistic way but almost like a living diary a reader could refer to when they had questions about how to live the Christian faith. It was meant as a supplement to the Bible.

Sometime after then, the BoD started to read more like a legal document that provided for the administration of the church as well as guidelines for how clergy and lay people can be held accountable, how the trustees are to go about their work, how administrative councils can function, as well as issues that affect life in this world we share. Those issues that affect life in this world we share are referred to as the Social Principles.

The Social Principles were last revised in 1972. The Social Principles just underwent the first significant revision in 50 years, and – as I understand it – have been approved by the General Conference which is meeting right now. When General Conference is over, an updated version of the Book of Discipline will be published to guide the denomination for the next four years until the next General Conference.

Since the disaffiliations that started with the 2019 special session of General Conference, what I am seeing at General Conference this year is significant. The Book of Discipline will be experiencing some of the most significant revisions in my 27 years in ministry. None of those changes affect the doctrine of the church (Jesus' teaching), but they certainly have significant implications for the future of our global church and the regions that have been created and are in the process of being implemented into the BoD. I feel like this is one of the most exciting things I've seen come from General Conference and as I've watched GC sessions, I've found myself inspired and I'm excited by the changes coming.

But on a side note: I'm glad the 2024 BoD won't be out for a few months because I have more than enough reading I'm doing right now, and I have a lot more reading to do. One of my summer goals is to get as many of the books read as I can because everything I'm reading has significant implications for our life together in Concordia and what ministry might look like in the future.

So, let me repeat. This is an exciting time for the United Methodist Church and its future. My prayer is that every one of us lives into that future and rejoices what God is in the process of doing in our lives.

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On another note: I want to thank everyone who helped out with my transportation and lodging costs to Colorado for my sister's celebration of life. As I think I have shared, Sally and I were very close. I think my childhood helped her become the mother and teacher she became, and I know that aside from my parents, she was the first and probably most influential mentor I had. I know she is with me every day; my hope, wish and effort is to honor her legacy the best way I can.

Trustee Update:

Late last year, the church's insurance carrier issued the church a notice of non-renewal – along with many other churches throughout western Kansas. As a result, on January 1st, the church's insurance coverage changed. The new carrier is providing increased coverage at a lower price, but there is a catch. A building inspection was recently completed and there are several required changes and repairs that need to be made, including removal of all combustible material from the boiler and air handler rooms. These requirements give us the opportunity to have a "work day"!

Please join us for a work day on the afternoon of Sunday, May 19th. Work will start immediately after church to remove the items from the mechanical rooms and organize these items along with the cleaning and paper supplies into new homes. If we have enough participants, work is also need to complete some spring spruce-ups, including trimming shrubs around the building.

Things to come:

In April, the church received a generous gift in memory of Anita Chartier from her family. They have requested that those funds be used to: add some control wiring for our heating system in an effort to increase its efficiency, replace the exhaust fans in the kitchen and bathrooms, remove and replace the ceiling grid and tiles in the kitchen, replace the counters in the kitchen, and paint the kitchen walls and cabinets. This exciting gift will help renovate an area of the church that sees a lot of heavy use and has needed attention for quite some time. A committee will be formed develop an overall plan for the renovation project, including selection of materials and colors for the kitchen. If you would like to participate in these discussions, please let Monte Wentz or the church office know.

This winter, it was discovered that the lightning ground cable from the cross on the steeple had broken. The church Council has approved its repair and Hoods should be on site within the next month with a crane to remove the cross, repair the grounding wire, and replace it at the top of the steeple.



Community Baby Shower

We partnered with the Cloud County Health Department to host a Community Baby Shower that had 16 participants (7 new or expectant mothers) and 24 participants from 13 community partners. We were thrilled to hand out layette sets to families in person!



Enhanced Online Giving

By creating an account, you will also have access to all of the giving options mentioned above. If you do not want to create an account, there is an option to give as a guest.

Cloud County Resource Center Needs

The Food Bank is open and accepting donations of cash or food items for distribution on Monday/Wednesday/Friday from 9:00 am – 5:00 pm and Tuesday/Thursday from 1:00 – 5:00 pm. Starting on March 1st, the Food Bank can be utilized once each month; an appointment must be made 24 hours in advance to pick up food at the Food Bank.

Items can be left for your letter carrier to pickup or dropped off at the CCRC from 8:00 am – 1:00 pm on May 11th. Most needed items include: Macaroni and Cheese, Box Dinners, Ramen, Peanut Butter, Jelly, Cereal, Canned Fruit, Canned Meats, Condiments, Bar Soap, Feminine Hygiene Pads, Razors, Baby Formula, Shave Gel, Body Wash.































"Murder in the Mine"




Everything turned out great, as none of us was the victim or the murderer! Thank you Angie for putting the trip together!!!
